The one-time registration fee of \$40 will cover all four of the lectures. A light breakfast will be offered.

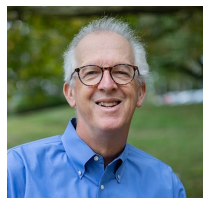
